# A Philosopher's Guide to the Galaxy

# **Course Description**

In this course students will grapple with age-old questions in the context of great works of science fiction. Readings and assignments will tie pressing philosophical issues to the real world, creating a unique opportunity for critical discussion and writing assignments. The course will have four major units: the metaphysics of time travel, epistemology, philosophy of mind, and ethics.

## **Course Objectives**

The major objective of the course is to give students the chance to explore a wide range of philosophical issues in the contexts of literature and real world applications. Students who complete the readings and participate in class will develop a basic competence in each of the areas covered by the course. They will also be exposed to basic logical notions including the definition of an argument, deductive vs. inductive arguments, validity, and soundness. They will learn argumentation strategies, and will have an opportunity to greatly improve their writing and debating abilities.
